1. If she **knew** the answer, she **would tell** you.
(short form: she'd tell)
2. We **would swim** every day if we **lived** close to the beach.
(short form: We'd swim)
3. If you **asked** them, **would** they **come**?
4. If I **felt** sick, I **would not go** to class.
(short form: I **wouldn't go**)*
5. We **would save** more money if we **did not go** to restaurants all the time.
(short forms: We'd save; we **didn't go**)
6. If I **won** the lottery, I **would buy** a boat.
(short form: I'd buy)
7. Jack **would win** the game if he **tried** harder.
(NB: We don't usually contract names and "would" when we write, so we don't usually write "Jack'd".)
8. I **would not stay** if I **were not** happy. / ... if I **was not** happy.
(short forms: I **wouldn't stay**; I **weren't**; I **wasn't**)*
9. What **would** Mary **do** if she **were** here? / ... if she **was** here?
10. If I **were you**, I **would not worry** about it. / If I **was you**, ...
(short form: I **wouldn't worry**)*
